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## 1.1 INTRODUCTION

Parisutham Nadar , a three time Former M.L.A Thanjavur. It is being governed by Parisutham Philominal Educational and Charitable Society. PITS provides Technical Education in the fields of Engineering. The Institution is located in Out skirts of Thanjavur, Tamil Nadu and that Students from rural area and low income family get benefited. In order to improve life style and personality of rural students, PITS has Finishing School with a curriculum spread over four years for students. The aim is to improve communication skills, soft skills, creativity, perception and assist students in self-development.

## **1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY**

### **Curricular Aspects**

PITS is one of the well-known self-financing Institutions. It admits eligible students through Single Window Counseling conducted by Department of Technical Education, Chennai. It is eligible to admit 50% students under Management Quota due to Minority Status. Admission through Management quota is unbiased and as per the norms of Consortium of Self-Financing colleges.

The College being an Institution affiliated to Anna University Chennai, adapts to the syllabi prescribed by the University. However, the College devises innovative and creative methods for the delivery of the curricula.

Internalizing the needs of the primary stakeholders – STUDENTS – the teachers practice different techniques to achieve the set outcomes for each course and the overall attainment of the outcomes of each program. Faculty are encouraged to attend Faculty development programs organized by the University and the Institution to boost their knowledge and teaching efficacy. For the new Teachers, LEARNING EDUCATION AND APTITUDE PROGRAM (LEAP) - an Orientation and FACULTY LECTURE IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (FLIP) - a method of practice are conducted every year. While the HoDs allotting subjects to the faculty, to improve their writing skills, LECTURE IMPROVEMENT TEST (LIT) is being conducted every Semester.

The identified gaps in curriculum are bridged by Add on / Value Added Courses (VAC) and being extended the contents of the course beyond the prescribed syllabi. The content of the value added courses are designed in consultation with leading industries and companies. Faculty, who are members of the Boards of Studies utilize their experience and expertise in suggesting, valuable modifications in the University syllabi, in the interests of the students and the prospective employers. ELITE FORUMS are functioning in order to coach the Smart Learners to get University Ranks. Slow Learners are being given intensive coaching by WEAK STUDENTS INTENSIVE TRAINING (WIT) program.

The main objectives of the institution includes

- Continual improvement, team work and total involvement of faculty and support staff.
- Spoken English enforcement.
- Continual up-gradation of knowledge based skills and attitude of faculty and support staffs.
- Total involvement of Students.
- Optimum utilization of resources and interaction with the industry.

### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

PITS is affiliated to Anna University and hence it follows the Academic Calendar provided by the University. Reopening, conduct of internal exams and Last working day will be intimated to the Institutions. Based on that, the academic calendar is planned by the institution and allotting the duration for conduct of internal assessment processes for theory and lab courses and for co- curricular activities. Each department has its own envisaged Vision and Mission Statements which are tuned to align with that of the College. The teaching methods are planned and executed to achieve the course and program outcomes, as the College believes in outcome based education. Teaching is more vibrant in the institution by following 100% medium of instruction in English. All the Class rooms are provided projection facilities which enable the teachers to use visual aids. Teachers are given permission to use the Centralized library and their department library. Their 50 minutes teaching duration is split as 5:40:5 ie attendance taking: teaching: interaction.

Various Orientation program are being conducted for effective learning. Technical Quiz, Technical Presentations, Industrial Visits and Project demos are conducted for micro learning. Guest lectures are the important factor that the students like most.

Daily Assessment (DAT), Weekly assessment tests and Cyclic assessment tests (CAT) are conducted. Retest for the failures in DAT will be conducted during ninth period after giving proper revision during eighth period. The evaluation processes are made very transparent and the marks obtained are displayed on the notice boards. A well-planned mechanism is in place for addressing the grievances if any raised by the students regarding assessment. Adhering to the dates specified by the University, the internal assessment marks of the students are

uploaded in the University website. For all the tests, retests are conducted for the absentee and failures. Before the commencement of Semester Examination, RESIDENTIAL CAMP is organized to help the students to be Exam ready.

### **Research, Innovations and Extension**

Within this short span, the institute has developed its capability to undertake research and consultancy projects focused on technology, engineering and social problems. The faculties of this institution are working in full-swing towards establishing its full-fledged Research Cell. The faculties of PITS are exposed to the research culture by organizing National / International seminars and conferences. The research publications and presentations have been well received and cited by other researchers. They are permitted to attend all the technical events conducted by other institutions also. The ethos is transmitted to the students who inculcate the interest and rise to the demands of teachers as researchers. An orientation on Journal Publication, Manuscript writing and Plagiarism checking are thoroughly taught to the faculty. All the UG/PG projects are under micro trimming and encourage the students for publishing their findings. Faculty who are publishing research articles are encouraged by special awards in the annual day function.

The outcome of the research work has resulted in expertise sharing and offering consultation to the industries, manufacturers or scholars from other institutions. As a result, all the departments are able to contribute towards consultation for the real world problems what the society faces. The products / processes developed through research and consultancy have been initiated to registered for patenting. The holistic development of the student is a main focus of the college as defined in one of the Mission statements of the College. Further, Science ideas (SCIDEA) are most welcome in the campus and Project Expo is arranged every year in the month of January. School children, College students, Public and media are invited to visit the Expo.

To fulfill need of their Skill development, a variety of extra-curricular activities such as Technical Events, Sports, Social Events and few extension activities are conducted. These activities build competitive and team spirits, the emotional intelligence and the mind-set of the students to address the societal needs. Gender equity is given in all the extension activities given to the students. Mind refreshing Programs, Leadership award Programs, Technical aptitude sessions, and Mock interview sessions are conducted from the day they joined the college.

### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

PITS is sprawled over an area of 50 acres with lush green campus with 5000 trees. It is located within 2 km distance from city. The instructional area covers spacious all administrative wings, class rooms, tutorial rooms, laboratories, library and faculty cabins. Computing center, photocopying facility, health care center, spacious canteen with hygienic food, Stores and residential blocks for girls and boys also built inside the campus. All the class rooms are fitted with over head projectors. Proper lighting and ventilation are highly maintained in the teaching zone. Teaching zone is under supervision for its hygiene and safety of the stake holders. Common rooms and wash rooms are maintained with utmost care to keep all away from infections.

Play ground with turfing, facilities for Boxing, Fencing, Swimming, Silambattam, Cricket, Football, Hockey, Volley ball, Lawn tennis, Roller-skating, Beach volley ball, Archery, Rifle shooting, Ball badminton, cricket,

Kabadi, Hand Ball, Kho-kho, Campus jogging and Basket ball are also available as out-door facility for physical activities. PITS Students Centre is a large in-door facility for Billiards, Table tennis, Gyms, carom, chess, squash and badminton (shuttle). All play fields and indoor facilities are flood-lit. Women too participate in all these activities in large numbers. This huge Students Centre has been designed to encourage students' activities and relaxation. It also houses the food courts, Cafeteria, mini stores, television facility, browsing facility and students lounge as well. Seminar halls and A/C auditorium add to the infrastructure extravaganza of the college. Potable R.O water supply, uninterrupted power supply through invertors and generators, fire extinguishers for safety and buses to transport students from various parts of the city are the basic well-maintained infrastructure.

A digital well-equipped library with OPAC, Auto LIB, e-journals and NPTEL materials enrich the learning experience of staff and students. Multimedia library, Language lab, 50MBps fast Internet connectivity with localized wi-fi facility; PITS INTRANET adds technological support to the learning process. All the payments for tuition fee, mess fee, lodging fee and transport fee can be made online in order to minimize the time and avoid risks.

### **Student Support and Progression**

In order to sustain the academic development of the learners, a strong back up system has been developed. The financial needs of the students are addressed through facilitating the procurement of Government Scholarships every year and by extending free boarding and lodging for very needy students, accepting the tuition fee in installments etc. The emotional stability is taken care of by internal and external counseling, Grievance Redressal cell and Gender cell. Women Empowerment Cell is functioning to give the gender equite to women.

In addition to the academic activities, special classes on yoga are being conducted for the everyday wellness of students. As a unique addition, the Chairman of PITS personally conducts "Finishing School" session for the students which essentially focus on personality development. Music classes, singing classes are conducted during the evening hours. ART OF LIVING class is arranged for final year students to overcome stress.

Slow learners are identified and intensive training is given to them. Weakness in them is identified by the Batch Counselors and counselling is given to them to gain mental strength. For all the tough papers, tuition are arranged for the failures by the senior faculty at free of cost. Beyond that, during the study holidays, separate writing practice is given to them in Examination point of view and it really makes the students to come out of the fear of Examination.

An active placement cell headed by an able placement officer ensures the training for on-campus and off campus interviews. The placement officer coordinates with the prospective employers in the IT / non-IT sector and arranges for on-campus interviews. For students who have a desire to take up jobs in core engineering industries, on- campus and off- campus interviews either pooled or exclusively for PITS students are arranged. Guidance is given to those who wish to progress towards higher studies and books and materials for clearing qualifying examinations like GATE, TANCET, TNPSC, CAT and GMAT are made available. The would-be entrepreneurs are exposed to the intricacies of starting and successfully running an enterprise and are also introduced to successful entrepreneurs for emulating and learning.

## **Governance, Leadership and Management**

The Vision, Mission, Quality Policy and the goals of the Institution are well defined and self – explanatory. To attain the stated Vision, Mission and the goals a well structured process is in place, the mechanism of which is monitored at various levels. The overall governance of the college is by the Governing council headed by the Chairman. The Dean (Academics) administers the everyday process of the college and the responsibility and leadership is handled by the Principal. Next to the Principal in the hierarchy are the Heads of Departments on the academic side and the Office Manager on the administrative side. Counselling system is very effective and it is programmed and performed in better way by the Batch Counselors.

All the administrative heads are instructed accordingly that they are decentralized heads. They are very well aware of their scope of works and so there is no way of interrupting others works by their needs. All the heads are recommended by the Management to attend leadership program and it is sponsored by the management. Chairman and all the trust members report to the college everyday and they work for the allotted tasks full day. This is the reason of enrichment in all the wings of the institution. For all the mega events, Chairman of the institution conducts meeting with the office bearers and explain the agenda in detail. Management is very effective in managing the man power and human resources.

Estate manager is fully incharge of providing essential needs like water, food, transport and etc. for all the stake holders. He is incharge of purchase. All the resources for the effective function of the institution is supplied to the stake holders at the right time and no works are delayed.

Administrative officer is fully available in the institution to support the students for their various needs like scholarships and freeships by the management. The Placement cell is an autonomous department which functions under the supervision of the Secretary of the Institution. The designation Director / Technical Activities is hold by one of the trustee.

## **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

The college in its tenure in the academic service has impacted the society with many best practices. The college is well-known for its discipline and academic excellence, followed by its enviable placement record. The special attention is given to the students to instill confidence in them to become achievers. PITS believes both Technical and Soft skill are needed for better placement. So, continuously it implements two best practices.

### **1. Finishing School (FS)**

The purpose of the Finishing School is to train students to be industry ready and adapt to changes, teach them skills to face interviews and to groom students. This unique program given by the Finishing School is largely appreciated by students and parents. These programs embedded into the curriculum and teach lifeline skills-manners, etiquette, Spoken English and other skills like singing, debating, group discussion and aptitude programs. Grooming lessons are taught and enforced right from the day one. Yoga, aerobics, silambam and singing classes are compulsory. To induce creativity, sand sculpting, clay modeling and chart making sessions are also conducted. These activities are designed to promote logical thinking, team work and leadership.

### **2. Technical Aptitude Training Session (TATS)**

The campus recruitment comes under the purview of the placement cell. At the end of the third year, students



are given the choice to opt for campus placement, the other choices being progression to higher studies/ aiming to be an entrepreneur. The choice of the student is endorsed by the parent / guardian in writing. This choice stream lines the student towards his/her future. A special syllabus is framed by the leading corporate for the Placement seeking students. Two hours / Week will be given for teaching the content. An hour multiple Choice Question Test will be conducted every week. It will be evaluated within 24 hours and Key discussion class will be conducted for an hour. So, students will get clarification immediately about the logics to be learnt for the industry readiness. It gives the knowledge about the corporate and overcome the shock of gap between the institution and Industry.

## 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

### 2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

#### Response:

Parisutham Institute of Technology and science admits first-year B.E. students under Government Quota through single window counselling system based on their Higher Secondary Examination (HSC) marks. The seats under Management Quota are filled through Consortium of Self Financing Colleges. Entire admission process is managed by Tamil Nadu Engineering Admissions (TNEA) conducted by Department of Technical Education (DOTE).

- When students got admitted in our Institution, Orientation program on “Facing the Change” to understand the change in environment is organized by REN Academy for the freshers every year.
- The Institution conducts bridge courses for Mathematics and Physics to the first year students to enrich their knowledge in the specific engineering stream. At the end of the course, tests were conducted to evaluate the knowledge & skills of the students. Screening test for English Language Skills is conducted by the Institution for the I year students
- The institution conducts Daily Assessment Test (DAT), Cyclic Assessment Test (CAT) and Rehearsal exams to assess the learning level of the students as per the guidelines of Anna University for Internal Assessment.
- The learning levels of the students are assessed based on performance in Internal Assessment test and the students are categorized as advanced learners and slow learners.

#### Steps for Improving the Performance of Slow Learners

- Spoken English class is being conducted for Tamil medium and rural students to help them study and understand basic of the English language.
- Bridge classes in Engineering Mathematics are organized for lateral entry students to upgrade their mathematical skills.
- Students who have scored less than fifty percent are given more attention by conducting classes beyond working hours through study hour and conducting retest on the same day. In addition to that the college conducts residential camp, week students intensive training (WIT) for students before University Examinations.
- During study holidays special library study camp is being conducted to improve the presentation.
- Supporting study materials and Assignments are also given Important topics in each course, based on university question papers are also discussed during the special classes

#### Methodologies to Encourage Self Learners

- Students with good academic performance are identified and their performance is closely monitored and is counseled regularly by the Head of the department for achieving higher levels.
- During the tutorial hours, additional classes enrich knowledge level problems are given to develop their analytical skills
- ELITE Forum in PITS identifies bright students, challenging assignments and questions are given to them to improve their writing skills in exam point of view.

ADDITIONALLY,

- To improve their soft skills, students are given special training in the form of Technical Aptitude Training Session(TATS) through Training and Placement cell.

### 2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

**Response:**

In tune with the vision of our institution to create disciplined, conscientious and enterprising professionals,PITS focused on the following student centric learning methodologies.

#### Experiential learning

- In PITS subject faculty for the concerned laboratory conducts experiments and records the reading for all laboratory experiment prescribed in the Syllabus. Master Record is prepared before the commencement of every semester by all the departments. Course syllabus, lab manual and question papers details provided in the Master Record are verified by the department HOD.
- Students are required to perform laboratory experiments to understand the basic theoretical concepts.
- Viva voce for each experiment is conducted in the laboratory during record submission for all students.
- From every laboratory course students are encouraged to exhibit the concepts learnt in that laboratory course in the form of Project and Mini project.

- The institution conducts seminar classes for all students in every semester to improve their communication skills and competence where the participants engage in the discussion of an academic subject for the aim of gaining a better insight into the subject.
- In PITS students are required to submit 5 assignments totally for each subjects so that the students gain more knowledge about the advanced technology in the same subject and that enrich students with new Technology.

## 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

### 2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

#### Response:

PITS is affiliated to Anna University and the process of evaluation is followed as per the University guidelines. The quality of Engineering Education is the direct outcome of knowledge implanted and evaluated through formal examination. The education process in any discipline of learning ends with examinations. The Institute conducts more number of internal assessment tests in the form of Daily Assessment Test (DAT), Cyclic Assessment Test (CAT), Rehearsal Exam, Retest, Study camp and Week students Intensive Test (WIT) in order to expose the students for continuous evaluation.

#### Process of Internal Tests Question Papers Setting

- The Controller of Examination Cell will coordinate all the activities related to the conduct of Internal Assessment Tests. Every Department has Academic counselor to facilitate the examination process in a smooth and efficient manner.
- Three sets of Question Papers for internal assessments are prepared by subject faculty and the question papers are checked for the course objective achieved target level by the Academic Counselor and then approved by the HODs before submitting it to Controller of Examination (COE). Academic counselor of each department is authorized to select one best question paper and one question paper for retest.

#### Criteria for Evaluation

- The tests and model examinations schedule is given in advance and conducted in a centralized practice, on the same pattern as that of a University examination, thus ensuring rigor and transparency.
- Central Evaluation scheme is followed for CAT and Rehearsal Examination.
- All the answer scripts are evaluated by the subject faculty and distributed to the students next day during working hours and checked by HOD. Second evaluation of answer scripts has been carried out in each department for CAT and Rehearsal Exam in order to check the deviation for marks.
- Result analysis in graphical representation is prepared by Controller of Examination (COE) to all the departments.
- Marks are entered in the college database for future reference and also in counseling records to analyze their performance regularly. Result analysis is done for all the classes in the department and necessary action will be taken to improve the passed percentage like conducting retest for failed students, providing regular counseling.
- Internal Marks are calculated for each student based on their performance in the internal Tests. The

students' performance is monitored periodically through direct and indirect methods of assessment such as DAT, CAT, Assignments and seminars.

- The Institute encourages final year students to do in house projects with the help of Internal Project Supervisor. Internal assessment for Project Viva is calculated based on the student performance in zeroth, first, second, third and model reviews conducted by their respective department. The outcome of the project is evaluated by External and Internal Examiners as per the rules of the Anna University
- The performance of the student is informed to the parents through progress reports. Parents of slow learners are informed about the retest pattern needed for their ward well in advance.

### 2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient

#### Response:

- Orientation day for New comers serve as the best platform to communicate the process of the evaluation system to all the parents and students.
- The process of internal assessment is well defined and transparent and is communicated to the students, faculties, and parents. The academic schedule in line with the Anna University schedule is prepared well ahead and is circulated to all the students.
- Regular interactions of HOD'S and faculties with the students during department meetings, class committee meetings and counseling sessions are regularized for better understanding between faculties and students.
- At the beginning of each semester, HODs convene staff meeting to disseminate information on any changes in the evaluation/assessment system. In PITS the scheme of evaluation for cyclic test and model exam is uniformly followed across all departments. Part A questions are evaluated by key words and marks are awarded to students. Part B and Part C questions are evaluated through concept application, Formulae, problem approach, data substitution, description, diagram representation, results, and presentation.
- Answer scripts of examinations are distributed to the students after evaluation to bring out the discrepancies, if any, to the notice of teacher concerned, and the necessary corrections are carried out.
- The marks awarded to the students in the continuous assessment tests and the attendance percentage are communicated to parents by the institution, which is also accessible through the website of the affiliating university ([www.coe1.annauniv.edu](http://www.coe1.annauniv.edu))
- As per the Anna University regulations, 80% marks are for the end semester exams and 20% for internal marks. The performance of the students in the internal assessment tests is informed to the students immediately after the completion of assessment tests.
- Other types of grievances like data missing in the question papers, questions from outside the syllabus, question paper being tough, logical reasoning etc., are communicated to the Controller of

Examinations by the concerned subject faculty on the approval of the Principal through the web portal on the same day of the examination.

- The students are made aware of the evaluation procedures including revaluation and challenge valuation, examination pattern of College and the University, well in advance through circulars.
- Any change in the schemes of evaluation, updates on curriculum revision, alterations in the question paper patterns are conveyed to the students and the faculty through circulars received from the University.
- The marks in the internal tests are then uploaded in the Anna University web portal along with the attendance periodically as scheduled by the Anna University. The performance of the students in internal tests and end semester examinations will also be sent to the parents through Postal letter.

## 2.6.2 Attainment of programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

### Response:

#### 1. Attainment of Course Outcomes:

- The effectiveness of assessment of the Course Outcome (CO) can be justified with the help of performance in internal assessment and course end semester examination. The internal assessment includes Daily Assessment Test (DAT), Cyclic Assessment Test (CAT), Assignments, Seminar and Model Examination. Course end examination is conducted by the University, for both theory and practical courses.
- Students are sensitized to their level of understanding of a particular CO and encouraged to study the course keeping in view the course outcome, programme outcome and programme specific outcome.
- The formative assessment of lab courses is also almost uniform across the departments. Each experiment is valued for the procedure, data collection, result obtained, graphical representation, Viva Voce and record writing. Viva –Voce is conducted all experiment in each laboratory and the marks will be included for calculating the internal marks. A model lab exam is conducted at the end of the semester and the marks obtained are included for calculation of internal assessment marks.
- Internal Assessments are conducted periodically as per the schedule given by the University and the CO of the respective courses is assessed based on the performance of the students. All the assessment components and the course outcome target attainment levels are fixed before the commencement of the course by the course teacher and are reviewed by the HOD.
- The target attainment levels will be set by considering the students' previous course outcome attainments in the earlier semesters courses and the nature of the particular course. Target levels vary from course to course. For internal assessments, attainment is measured from internal test,



assignment, seminar and technical quiz,

## 2. Attainment of Program Outcomes and Program Specific Outcomes:

- Placement is designated as the primary means in assessing the realisation of the intended POs and PSOs. The annual campus placement of students reveals the employability quotient-based outcome.
- With the examination system as the mechanism for the assessment of COs, the institution ensures the inculcation of the theoretical and practical essentials of every course among students. The annual percentage of pass rate, which includes the Internal and External Examinations, is the quantitative yardstick in this direction.
- In semester evaluation the attainment of program outcomes and program specific outcomes are determined by DAT, CAT, Rehearsal Exam, assignment, seminar presentation, Techathon, department technical events and attendance. End semester evaluation is determined by the performance in the University Examination.
- Questions in the continuous assessment test are framed in such a way to appropriately judge the course outcomes which in turn maps to programme specific outcomes.
- Course exit survey is collected at the end of the course and the Graduate exit survey is collected at the end of the programme. Both of the above are analyzed statistically for the attainment of PO's.
- Attainment of Program Outcomes and Program Specific Outcome is also measured by exit survey which is collected at the end of the programme, Alumni feedback, placement record, recruiters feedback and employer feedback.

- OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue) has been created to facilitate the access to the source.
- The Central library has a collection of 21,807 books with 9,248 Titles, 493 back volumes, 627 project reports, 2,251 magazines and 1,973 multimedia packages with CDs and DVDs.
- Our institution central library subscribes 4 newspapers.
- The digital unit of the library section has 8 computers with high speed internet connection.
- We have 609 specialized books (Encyclopedias / Handbooks / Expensive Reference Books) to improve the knowledge of the students and faculties.
- The central library of our institution has institutional membership with DELNET (a pack of e-journals).
- The library has 105 seating capacity overall.
- **Dr.Victor Raja Manickam** eminent Scientist and Geologist who was awarded **Dr.ABDULKALAM Lifetime Achiever National Award** donated 903 books to our institution.
- The central library has separate section for GATE and Competitive examination books.
- Library has provision for students to refer old question papers for preparing their examination.

- We allotted a team of experts for each service department to maintain the facilities such as building, transport, electrical, gardening, water facility, furniture etc.,
- Separate complaint register is maintained for various services.

#### MAINTENANCE OF LABORATORY

##### PURCHASE:

- According to curriculum, the need of new equipment list is submitted by the lab coordinators and lab in charge to DEAN through HOD.
- After verification of the report, the quotation is called for purchasing from various concerns in the view of DEAN and the HOD.
- According to the quotation from various concerns, the Lab in charge is prepared comparative statement and Forwarded to the DEAN through HOD for approval.
- After Approval of DEAN the purchasing order is prepared by the Lab in charge and forwarded to the concern through the HOD.
- The new equipment is checked in the presence of Lab coordinator and Lab in charge and the calibration report is submitted to the DEAN through HOD.
- After verification of the calibration report by the Dean, the work statement and the bills are submitted to the Accounts Department.

#### SERVICE OF THE EQUIPMENT

- Periodical analysis and review of equipments are carried out according to the schedule maintained by the lab coordinators.
- Minor problems are repaired by the lab instructor and staff members.
- The major problems are repaired by outsource and generally the annual maintenance is carried out

regularly.

### **The following procedures are to be followed at the time of service.**

- The service request is forwarded to the DEAN (Academics) through lab in charge and HOD.

1. After approval of Dean, Quotation is called for service.

2. The service will be carried out in front of the lab in charge. Further checking and tests would be carried out in the presence of HOD and lab in charge.

3. After the successful completion of service, the work statement and bills are submitted to the Accounts Department.

### **STOCK VERIFICATION**

- Stock verification is carried out at the end of every semester. The lab instructor and the staff in-charges take part in the stock verification.
- The availability of equipments, requirements of equipments, service durability of the equipments are checked while verifying the stock register.
- After stock verification, the Lab in charge submits the statement to the **DEAN** through **HOD** for approval.
- During the stock verification, the consumable list also prepared by the respective lab instructor and staff in charge. It is also submitted to **DEAN** through the **HOD**.
- Breakage is brought to the knowledge of **HOD** immediately and the breakage report is submitted to the **DEAN** through **HOD**.

### **MAINTENANCE OF COMPUTER LABORATORY**

- According to the curriculum software required is noted by the Lab coordinator and lab in charge then forwarded to the **Director Of Technical Activities** through **HOD and DEAN**
- In order to purchase the software, **Director Of Technical Activities** is carried out the full review of the software modules and purchases the software according to the needs.
- Installing of firewall, antivirus, failure of SMPS, Boot failure, System Fast response are monitored and recorded. The status of the each system is report to **Director Of Technical Activities** on every day.
- Air conditioning system is serviced regularly by the team of electrical department and report is submitted to the DEAN.
- Stock verification is carried out at the end of every semester. The lab instructor and the staff in-charges take part in the stock verification.
- The availability of equipments, requirements of equipments, service durability of the equipments are checked while verifying the stock register.
- After the stock verification the report is submitted to the DEAN through HOD.
- Complete cleanliness and hygiene is well maintained.

### **TRANSPORT MAINTENANCE**

- A separate team works under the section supervisor to maintain the transport facility.
- All basic documents (insurance, license of the drivers, emission control certificate, and approval certificate) are recorded and monitored closely.
- Routine checkup for fuel level and oil level are carried out thrice in a week.
- Breakdown of any components are repaired quickly or replacement is carried out with respective of the damages.

### **LIBRARY MAINTENANCE**

- Library faculty involves energetic monitoring and verification of all registers.
- Frequent clearing the tables and arrangement of books in the rack to prevent the confusion of the book arrangement.
- Timely updation of books, journals and Supplier details.
- Annual stock verification is carried out as per the instruction from DEAN (Academics).
- The e-journal software package and ILMS software are updated regularly.
- No Objection Certificate (NOC) report is updated at the end of the every semester by the library in charge and the report is submitted to the DEAN.
- Complete cleanliness and hygiene is well maintained.

### **SPORTS INFRASTRUCTURE MAINTENANCE**

- o **Finance Chair:** All the Financial decisions were made by this committee which is headed by the Principal .The committee fulfilled the financial needs of the various chairs by allocated the precise budget within the allotted fund to the conference.
- o **Local Chair:** The practical side of the conference was executed by this committee which is headed by the Principal associated with the faculties, non-teaching staff and student’s representatives. It is well equipped with excellent infrastructure to support each and every stage of the placement processes.
- As a part of the placement activity, the team goes for periodic corporate visits to leading companies to acquaint our establishment with the corporate world and as a result recruiters have responded to our call and visiting the campus for placement drives.
- The students are trained right from the first year by way of Finishing School classes for personality development. Prior to recruitment they are given intensive coaching in aptitude tests and interview process. This gives them the much needed confidence to face interviews.
- The purpose of the Finishing School is to train students to be industry ready and adapt to changes, teach them skills to face interviews and to groom students. This unique program given by the Finishing School is largely appreciated by students and parents. These programs embedded into the curriculum, teaches life skills, manners and etiquette. Spoken English and other skills like communication, group discussion and aptitude programs.
- Grooming lessons are taught and enforced right from the day one throughout the year.
- These activities are designed to promote logical thinking, team work and leadership.
- Video hour, Quiz hour, Role play, Panel Debates, Group Discussion, Class seminars, Viva voce, and Paper Presentation are conducted from first semester onwards. These activities are designed to made campus life lively and to increase students' self confidence and exposure.
- Almost 75% to 80% of the students get placed annually through Campus Interviews. About 10 to 13 Corporate Companies visit the campus every year for recruitment apart from Off-campus Interviewers.

With the help of our Placement and Training cell students have placed with the highest salary package of 4,



50, 000 per annum. Many high-profile companies like TCS, Infosys, Wipro, CTS, and Tech Mahindra, through Anna University Off- Campus and by On - Campus companies like IDBI federal, Face-Focus Academy, CSS corp, SSF Plastics, Karvy, and Sutherland. The performance of each employee is assessed semester wise after completion of one year of service. The intention is not only to objectively evaluate the performance as per established norms, but also to identify potential aspects for improvement that can eventually lead to further progress and growth of the employee.

Further, higher studies pursued by the faculty, papers published, guidance given to the students in the co curricular and extra-curricular activities and feedback given by students both during the semester and also at the semester end are also appropriately taken in to account during the appraisal.

Head of the department judges behavioural aspects of the teacher. Personality traits such as attitude, punctuality, commitment, professional ethics, communication skills, relationship with the co-workers and students, written skills, supportiveness to the students etc. are judged by the head of the department and recommended to the Principal of the Institution.

- Every day, students feedback is submitted to both HODs and the Principal which is a confidential report given by the student. Faculties are diagnosed for Lecture details, understanding, and teaching: satisfactory/not satisfactory, concern with students' progress & helpfulness, internal

marks are corrected and distributed.

- Every month faculty diagnostic report is sent to The Principal by the HODs. They are being monitored or Tracking student performance and attendance, Communication and presentation skills, Interest in improving students' academic performance, Teacher effectiveness (Whether students like the teaching), Class room Practices (Whether lecturing properly or whiling away the time), Updating domain Knowledge, Positive Teacher-behavior / Maturity, Preparation for classes (Utilizing free hours for class preparation), Library utilization, Class control, Speaking in English (Whether speaking in English always in the campus), Spoken English/ Discipline enforcement, Students feedback, Obedience, Attitude.
- Faculty evaluations are taken once in semester by the management and it is being informed to The Principal. The Principal will take appropriate decision to improve the skill of faculty. To improve teaching skill FLIP-Faculty Lecture Improvement Program is arranged.
- Subject wise result analysis is prepared by the HODs considering all internal test and semester examinations and submitted to The Principal. The Principal will counsel the faculty scoring less than 75%. Remedies to score good results will be suggested by The Principal.

## 6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

**6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes**

**Response:****Introduction of three question paper per course**

The IQAC focuses on the continuous improvement of the entire system for the students. There is a centralized examination cell to conduct the unit tests and the model examination (Daily Assessment Test for a period of 50 minutes for 20 Marks and cumulative Daily Assessment Test for a period of 1 hour and



40 minutes for 50 marks and Cyclic Assessment Test for a period of 3 hours for 100 marks and the Rehearsal examination for a period of 3 hours with 100 marks).

The examination cell has been functioning effectively and the staff handling the subjects prepares one question paper for each subject and hands over the same to the examination cell, examination cell allots the invigilators and the invigilators in general are from different departments. After monitoring the progress of the students, the management introduced a re-test procedure for slow learners; a separate question paper is prepared for retest and the slow learners are thus given another chance to improve performance. This system is being further improved by the recommendations of the IQAC cell and currently, there is a practice of submitting three question papers per course by the staff handling the course to the examination cell. The IQAC cell in charge select one of the three question papers at random and the same is given on the day of Daily Assessment Tests, Model examination and from the remaining two one is chosen for the corresponding retests.

The preparation of multiple question papers for one course with a few repeated questions enables the students getting exposed with more number of possible questions for their end semester examinations, which in turn improves their performance in the University Examinations.

### Student project exhibition

The management is very much concerned about the quality of projects the students undertake during final year. The IQAC suggested that the exhibition was to provide the preliminary knowledge of the projects and provide an opportunity for the students to demonstrate their learning experience. A project exhibition is conducted by all the departments every year since 2016 with name and style “SCIDEA” in the month of 26th January .The students completed the projects under the guidance of faculty members of the department. They demonstrated the working of their projects using charts and models to the judges and the visitors. Experts are invited from various departments to evaluate the projects exhibited by the students First three prizes are awarded for each department and this creates a healthy competition among the students and to go for socially relevant and innovative projects. Prizes are distributed for the winners during Annual day function. Prizes include merit certificates and cash awards and participation certificate for all participants. This is an initiative taken by the IQAC for doing a quality project in the final year. The outcome of the PROJECT EXHIBITION was that students were able to show their project at higher level and the process boosted their confidence.

Exclusive placement training for students from their first year to the final year is planned and executed by a separate Training and Placement Cell.

IQAC had been involved in providing inputs to the Training and Placement Cell :

- Creating a Career corner in the Library with posters for competitive examination, collection of current books for preparation of these examinations etc.
- Display of details on jobs related to the field of study, on the notice board of departments.
- Personality Development and Confidence building exercises.

A common Pre-Placement training in Aptitude, Soft Skills and Career Development Technique were in practice from 2012 for the final year students conducted by Face Academy and Shiva's Foundation. Based on the feedback received from the IQAC Placement Team, department specific technical training was also included for all departments.

A number of students have been selected during the campus selection process that has become the order of the day. The success of the senior students has been a strong motivation for the present students to qualify themselves with employable skills.

- To make the students totally involved in the teaching-learning process, Modern teaching techniques like, use of Interactive Board, E-learning and NPTEL videos make studies innovative and rewarding. All categories of students (advanced & slow learners) must benefit from the change and must be motivated. The students must be participatory and be passive targets. Towards this effort, teaching modules and lesson plans are organized.

### **Participatory Learning**

- Every class room is equipped with over-head & L.C.D. projectors and all lecture theatres and computer centers have LCD projection and E-Board facility.
- Students centered learning strategies have been initiated. Exercises are undertaken to enable students to acquire hands-on learning and first hand information from real life situations.

IQAC had been proposed few methodologies which are described below:

1. Industrial visits for experimental learning
2. MoUs with industries for training
3. Inplant training

These exercises help the students to develop composite skills like, data collection, organization, presentation and interpretation of data, usage of IT for preparation of thesis and power point presentation.

- Apart from the textbooks given for all the courses for all the students, comprehensive study

materials were prepared by the faculty for all the courses and given to all the students.

- Online tutorial videos were created and uploaded in the website for the benefit of students. These online videos are also accessible to students through LAN on the campus. All the Course Materials available with NPTEL in our LAN for access to students anytime.
- A language lab has been established for acquiring communication skills through interactive learning. DELNET facility in the library had been set up to promote self learning.

Parisutham Institute of Technology and Science prevents violence against women and girls. PITS puts the focus on fairness and justice regarding benefits and needs within the education, health and humanitarian sectors for women and men, girls and boys.

Parisutham Institute of Technology and Science conduct a special orientation programme exclusively for all the girl students once they step into the campus as an I year students. This program gives insight towards the co-education and personal hygiene. This session is used for them as an Ice breaking session for many issues which has been faced by them earlier.

PITS have a separate cell actively working for girls students such as Women Empowerment Cell, Anti-Sexual harassment Cell, Women Grievance Cell and so on. All the cells are headed and administrated by Women faculties of PITS and girl students of PITS.

Dr.Rachel Doss, psychologist is available to address the student's stress related issues. Student adoption scheme is carefully undertaken by each department. Each mentor is allocated with 15 students to counsel their academic and personal problems to create fearless environment. Counselling is given to the students during their leisure time and if necessary after college hours.

WEC of PITS is conducting various activities to create awareness about Women Safety and Social upliftment. In this point of view, Martial Arts for Self- Defence, Sylambam and Yoga are incorporated in regular time schedule. This practice improves Self- Confidence in them and the Mental Health. Due to this, Women are able to overcome physical and mental frustration and sharpen their concentration skill.

Sports and Games give wider opportunity for the women to take part equally to men and it improves their Physical Fitness and Discipline. Women team of PITS always honoured by various Trophies in all Sports and Games. National team for Roller Skating has PITS students as members.

Personality of a Woman improves when a platform is given to perform their skills. So, Sports Day, Annual Day, Cultural Week and all Extra- Curricular Activities are planned in such a way that Women are giving equal importance on the Stage. Learning Choreography, Costumes, Conducting competitions for Designing Hair and Megandi are being given free of cost.

In Academics, Women students shine better. To improve their Academic performances, women students from outstation are given opportunity to stay in the hostel to make them to be ready for Semester Examinations by means of Residential Camps.

PITS organize Blood Donation Camp on the Independence and the Republic Days. More eligible women

always come forward to donate their blood for the needy people and thus their social responsibility is exhibited. PITS always track the Outstanding Women Alumni and honour them in such a way that they will be the Chief Guest for the Independence and the Republic days. ##### **Solid waste management**

Our College practices the segregation of solid waste and its effective management in the campus. The collected waste is segregated at the source of the generation. The bins, which are used to collect the solid

wastes, placed at every corner of the corridor, wash rooms, common rooms and in the playing fields. The waste bins are also kept in laboratories, library, and classrooms. Old newspapers, used papers and journal files and all type of solid wastes are given for recycling to the external agencies.

**Incineration** – Incineration of waste materials converts the waste into ash and heat. Most of our college solid wastes are disposed by incinerating Compost – Organic materials such as vegetable peelings are used to make compost. Batteries and other toxic waste are avoided as these will contaminate the soil and water sources.

### **Liquid waste management**

Our institute sewage consists mostly of the waste water from sinks, tubs, showers, dishwashers and also from the water used to flush toilets. Soaps and detergents which are connected to septic tank through outlet pipes. Liquid Waste from the toilets is conveyed to the separate soak pit.

### **E-waste management**

Due to advancement in technology, various types of electronic gadgets are being manufactured and marketed. These products become out-dated after few months or years. Since these products contain some hazardous materials like lithium, lead, zinc, etc. improper disposal of these products is harmful for living beings. Therefore, management of E-waste is an important issue. E-waste management is done by collecting all the electronic waste generated in the institute premises at a central storage.

### **Also**

- The UPS batteries are recharged till the maximum number of cycles and once their life is over, exchanged by the suppliers / taken by recycle buyers.
- The life of the electronic items is extended by proper maintenance and taking care of minor repairs by the lab technicians.

The college does not generate any e-waste. Computers, UPS and Printers are sent to approve scrap dealers for safe disposal.

The purpose of the Finishing School is to train students to be industry-ready and adapt to changes, teach them skills to face interviews and to groom students. This unique program is largely appreciated by students and parents. #### **Title: Technical Aptitude Training Session (TATS)**

#### **The Practice:**

The campus recruitment comes under the purview of the placement cell. The placement cell has a team of Placement coordinators. This team plans and coordinates the activities related to placement training. The Syllabus for TAT's program is designed in such a way that incorporate with corporate experts and industrialists with the help of Mr.R.Balaji – Advisor – Placement cell. At the end of the third year, students are given the choice to opt for campus placement, the other choices being progression to higher studies/ aiming to be an entrepreneur. The choice of the student is endorsed by the parent / guardian in writing. This choice stream lines the student towards his her future. The Intensive placement training is offered only to those who have opted for campus recruitment. It is worth mentioning that till the third year all students undergo the common training programs irrespective of the options they may be choosing. Such an approach to the training programs ensures that all students get quipped to employability to a certain extent.

TATS are designed to identify suitable candidates for technical roles within the emergency services and engineering jobs.

The main objectives of conducting TATS in our college are as follows

- To persuade the students to possess a sound technical knowledge in the area of study
- To enhance the programming skills of students
- To train the students in time- bound answering of aptitude tests
- To inculcate the importance of projecting a smart appearance
- To groom the students to the corporate level
- To ensure that all eligible students are employed by the end of the final year of study.

**Technical Tests Content**

Technical aptitude test usually contain four main areas of aptitude:

**Verbal**-Verbal tests include vocabulary checking, reading speed, information processing and basic verbal reasoning.

**Mechanical**-Mechanical comprehension is measured through the introduction of concepts and scenarios from the real world that requires making inferences and minimal calculations.

**Numerical**-Numerical skills are measured in two ways - basic numeracy and numerical reasoning. In most cases, for both test types the use of a calculator is not allowed.

**Visual**-Spatial awareness, tracking abilities and visual estimations are measured.

There are great chances that additional skills will also be evaluated, such as technical understanding, process monitoring, fault diagnosis, inductive and diagrammatic reasoning.

**THE PRACTICE****Coaching**

- Special coaching is taken by FACE academy-Coimbatore for improving their aptitude skills.

**Test**

- Each test question incorporates a scenario and multiple answer options. There is only one correct answer.
- To solve a test question you need to identify one or more logical rules, engineering rules and apply them to identify the next or the 'odd-one-out' shape.
- For detail questions, they need to compose correct clarification.
- Objective questions which must be completed in a predefined time.

**Answer Key Discussion**

- Answer key discussion is coordinated for 50 minutes.
- In this area, clear clarification will be given by experienced assets in their particular field.
- At similar time, questions will be cleared, which helps them to fathom more inquiries in future.
- During this time, giving clear idea about to the students to choose the alternate logic from the given options
